

'I was a dead thing, in my heart. I knew it like a poison I drank each night and purged each morning. I knew that I was isolated, but I didn't understand my loneliness until I knew what I would give to escape it. What I would be willing to do.'

Mina has always felt alone. The daughter of the Duke of Schwartzstein, her father quickly remarried after her mother died but his new wife is too busy finding suitable matches for her own daughters to pay much attention to Mina. Now a young woman, Mina spends her days trudging the woods on the edge of their town of Blumwald. But in the depths of the wood, in a monstrous castle, a witch is getting ready to claim a companion as she does once every generation. When Mina offers herself up and finds herself stranded with the seductive witch in her castle, she uncovers a secret about the companions that have come before her which puts her own life in danger.

A story of two outsiders finding each other, *Bitterthorn* speaks to the universal human fears of loneliness and loss, the scariest monsters of all.

Discussion points:

- As the novel progresses, we learn of the witch's own story. Do you feel that her own experiences justify her taking a companion from Schwartzstein every fifty years?
